

U.S. Court of Appeals 11th Circuit Overrules District Court Educational Fair Use decision in Cambridge University Press v. Patton

<u>Up the creek without a paddle: downstream exclusion threatens</u> <u>Qualcomm</u>

With echoes of the blockbuster Apple v Samsung case (see past IPilogue coverage here, here and here), The United States International Trade Commission (ITC) announced on Oct 6th that it will move ahead with a section 337 investigation into patent infringement claims made against Samsung Electronics Co. Ltd by NVIDIA Corp. The plaintiff alleges infringement of seven of its patents. This claim could potentially affect many of Samsung's popular smartphone lines including the Galaxy Note,

the Galaxy S, and the Galaxy Tab. Qualcomm, maker of the Snapdragon mobile processor, is also a named defendant and in much higher danger of being economically affected by the suit, as the company is vulnerable to a downstream exclusion order that would block devices using its technology from being imported into the US.
