
February. Evermore Park, a Utah-based fantasy theme park, claimed that Swift infringed on their 'Evermore' trademark, which the park had registered since 2015. The park was seeking nearly \$2 million in damages. After a month of silence, Taylor Swift's team launched an unrelated suit against Evermore Park for copyright infringements. A volunteer at Evermore Park informed Swift's team that park employees performed several of her songs in 2019. On March 24, 2021, it was announced that both parties would drop their lawsuits. However, the question still stands: Who would succeed in these claims—the struggling park holding a registered trademark, or the multi-millionaire artist claiming copyright infringement? Or both?
