





In March, the IPilogue published an article about the Privacy Commissioner's condemnation of Clearview Al for violating PIPEDA and various provincial privacy legislation across Canada. This week, Privacy Commissioner Daniel Therrien tabled a report concluding that the RCMP's use of Clearview AI technology infringes the Privacy Act. The software compiles images from across the Internet into a database which the RCMP has used for criminal investigations. However, the investigation found that most RCMP searchers did not account for how they used this technology. You can read Catherine Tunney's article about this for CBC here.
